The research topic

Why community researchers?

To assist in this research project we have created a new role for Community Researchers who will play a key part in carrying out the research. As well as bringing their insight and experiences, Community Researchers will be crucial for encouraging the involvement of local people. This is a great opportunity:

- To contribute to important local research.
- To develop research skills and to build confidence through using them for real.
- To be part of a team.

The Community Researcher role involves:

- Taking part in training to develop the research skills needed.
- Designing the questions and choosing research methods.
- Collecting information from people from your community.
- Participating in the review and analysis of the information collected.
- Contributing to the final report of your findings.

Who can be a Community Researcher?

Community Researchers may be volunteers or committee members or individuals active or interested in (Add your community organisation or project or the local community). What is important is that you have knowledge and experience of your community; that you are keen to take on a new role, and that you have the time to commit to the project. Don't worry if you have no experience of research, we will provide training and support throughout the process.

What's in it for me?

Community Researcher is a voluntary role and offers the following benefits:

- Free training in action research techniques, data collection, analysis and reporting.
- All expenses will be covered.

Training and support

Community Researchers will be provided with training to develop research skills and to build their confidence in the role and activities involved. The training will cover: designing questions, choosing methods, collecting information, analysing information and reporting the findings. Once the training is complete, and the data collection is underway, ongoing support will be provided. There will also be an opportunity to evaluate and review your experience of being a Community Researcher at the end.
